

# COVID-19 Update

## **Baildon Update**

Throughout the summer and fall, the MJRWS has been working on the Baildon Agricultural Water Management Project. Both the Little and Big Baildon Networks are a high priority for addressing agricultural drainage. Between the two networks, there are over 250 quarter sections and 100 landowners. Through a series of open houses, we have been finalizing mapping for the Big Baildon Network. Little Baildon's mapping has been finalized, signatures collected, and the application was submitted to the Water Security Agency. Additionally, we have received funding from Environment and Climate Change Canada to implement a water quality testing plan for the Network. Currently, the MJRWS have completed two rounds of testing and will start again in the spring. We want to thank all the landowners that have attended our open houses, answered our phone calls, and engaged with us. Your participation is greatly appreciated and will ensure the success of this project.



### Preventing Aquatic Invasive Species Spread During Ice Fishing Season

With the summer season over, unfortunately the risk of spreading invasives is not. Zebra and Quagga mussels do not go away with the summer weather.

If the cold weather doesn't impact your fishing habit, there are some practices that you can include while ice fishing to help prevent the spread of invasives.

- Inspect your fishing equipment such as rods, nets, augers, hooks and scoops after moving between water bodies.
- Drain all water from equipment prior to leaving the waterbody.
- If using live bait; buy locally or buy from a licensed bait dealer.
- Dispose of your waste properly in waste containers.
- Dry your equipment for 5 or more days or disinfect when moving between water bodies. Disinfect with hot water (60°C), by freezing your equipment for 8 hours, or using a mixture of water and bleach.

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
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
